# Welcome to the 8th International Conference on Survivors of Rape (ICSoR 2026)

In an era where sexual violence remains a pervasive and evolving global challenge, the imperative to transform care, prevention and healing for survivors of rape has never been greater. The 8th International Conference on Survivors of Rape (ICSoR) brings together survivors, researchers, healthcare providers, experts and policymakers from across disciplines to foster collaborative action and share expertise.

This year's edition is hosted by Ghent University and Ghent University Hospital in the historic city of Ghent, Belgium and invites people from all backgrounds.

In the face of our evolving understanding of the impact of sexual violence, including life-course complications, revictimisation risks, and the growing need for diversity-sensitive care, ICSoR 2026 will focus on two interlinked themes:

- (1) Care as Prevention - Holistic, Trauma-Informed and Lifecourse Approaches to Prevent Revictimisation and/or Perpetration, and
- (2) Inclusive and Adaptive Care for Victims/Survivors with Complex Profiles - Standardisation versus Personalisation in Practice.

By convening diverse expertise and lived-experience, ICSoR 2026 seeks to advance understanding of the latest scientific evidence, innovations and effective practices in supporting survivors of sexual violence. In doing so, the conference aims to build new bridges between research, practice and policy and to catalyse collaborative networks that advance prevention, healing and equity for all survivors.

## Location Description:

# Official Program

We offer several types of interventions.

- Plenary lectures are addressing a specific issue in sexual violence of interest to the full audience.
- Panel discussions are interdisciplinary in nature and address salient and timely issues in sexual violence today.
- Seminars address a specific form of sexual violence or a specific population at risk of sexual violence.
- Oral presentations are individual presentations of research findings in about 10 minutes. Oral presentations are grouped in theme sessions with time for Q&A.
- Rapid fire presentations offer a concise overview of research findings, project outcomes or ideas through 5-minute oral presentations.
- Practice Clinics are presenting how specific parts of holistic care to survivors of sexual violence are provided in several parts of the world. These are grouped around psychosocial care, medical and forensic care and on interdisciplinary approaches in transmurial care pathways including law enforcement and social services. Presentations are shorter here and ample time is given to ask questions and exchange ideas and practices with the experts in the Practice Clinic.
- Poster presentations are animated at specific time slots; this means that the authors will stand next to their posters to answer questions the audience might have and to network.
- Creative interventions offer the opportunity to connect with the audience through an alternative manner, for example by an immersive exhibition, poetry slam session, guided walk, ...
